Hi Everyone,

Brian has asked me to try my hand at the newsletter this month, so here goes!

We're coming to the end of the summer season, and most of our visiting migrants have left for their long journey home. Of course we're always left with "our" birds that stick around all year, so it's never boring going out to see what you can find (or simply watching them in your own garden). And every so often something REALLY special comes along ... as you'll read in Judy-Lynn Wheeler's article about our latest Bird I.D. workshop:

Bird ID Workshop - Easter - 2018

Steve Davis has visited Wakkerstroom for many years and is always keen to return and share his knowledge and experiences of birding. The workshop "Confusing Common Birds of Wakkerstroom" was structured around the 8-point framework for identifying birds correctly. Attendees enjoyed the interaction and the quiz birds thrown in to test their skills. Accompanying Steve was Rocky, the 2018 Bird of the Year. Rocky travels with Steve to create awareness for the African Black Oystercatcher and was well photographed in various places over the Easter weekend. (Ed: as you know, Birdlife SA chooses one species of bird annually to raise awareness of its plight, so keep an eye out for media on Rocky's mates.)

The field outing on Sunday 1st April was misty and chilly mostly with the occasional light rain and very wet birds. There being no visible Weaver species, attention was turned to Swallows using the same identification principles. We were treated to Barn Swallows and White throated Swallow – adults and juveniles with an adult Banded Martin thrown in – and they were at rest which made identification easier. The highlight of this outing was a sighting of a Red Phalarope, a rare visitor to Wakkerstroom. This bird, with its snow white plumage, gives the immediate impression of a wader, but the fast swimming ability rules this out. This bird breeds on the Arctic Tundra and its plumage turns red. A mega- tick for those who braved the elements.

All round, the Easter weekend was a great one.

This is the Red (previously Grey) Phalarope spotted several times at the Wetland – note that the bird is not in its breeding colours in southern Africa as it breeds in the Arctic. It also has the characteristic feeding habit of darting back and forth and sometimes swimming around in tight circles.



And this is picture shows why the bird's name in our field guides was changed to Red Phalarope as it is called in the northern hemisphere! The bird when seen in full breeding plumage is anything but grey. One of the more acceptable name changes!

Global Big Day

This is an international event covering the 24 hours of May 5, 2018 and the object is to tick as many species as you can in that timeframe or as many hours that you have available on the day. Last year some club members took part in this event, run by Cornell University in America. It was sprung on us very late last year and our preparation left a bit to be desired. We must, this year, register ("Create an eBird Account") as an individual entrant or under the name of a team leader if you go out on the day in a group. Remember you can list birds anywhere you care to go, there are no geographical limits whatever, and no Atlas protocols! Your sightings may be submitted via the website or the eBird mobile app.

Could you please let Brian Guerin (083 415 6701) know as soon as possible if you are interested in taking part this year either as an individual or as part of a team? You can locate all the registration information by Googling www.Global Big Day and in particular "How do I Enter Sightings in eBird?"

Incidentally their website, www.eBird.org, is well worth a browse. Some of the distribution maps are "live" and show, in motion, the movement of migratory birds from their winter to summer quarters.

WOW Hide

This aspect of the hide was very exposed and sometimes became unpleasant when the winter winds blew. It is made of special timber and was coated with four coats of Waksol for good measure.
