8 May – Global Big Day



An annual celebration of the birds around you. No matter where you are located in the world, join global teams in sharing the birds they find through an app called eBird. Participating is easy — whether you are heading out into the countryside or happy to bird from your veranda. Your submitted observations help to better understand global bird populations through

animated abundance maps brought to you by eBird Science – see https://ebird.org/science. How do you participate you may ask? Register with eBird, if you haven't already, and start up your account. Download the free application – it's 100% free from start to finish. Watch and log the birds you see / hear on 8 May – its that simple. Global Big Day runs from midnight to midnight so watch the sightings start to roll in. There's a real-time page where you can follow what species approximately 170 teams around the globe are submitting.

15th May – the Wakkerstroom Bird Club's AGM

Join us at the BirdLife South Africa Wakkerstroom Centre to catch up on the past year's activities, select your committee and hear an awe-inspiring talk by Carina Pienaar from BirdLife South Africa. Watch your inboxes for more details soon.

Celebrating Success

Dr Melissa Whitecross, Landscape Conservation Programme Manager at BirdLife South Africa, reports the following: We are pleased to announce that the White-winged Flufftail Conservation Project has been awarded two small grants from the Club300 Foundation and the African Bird Club to support research exploring the population demographics, distribution, movement patterns and habitat requirements of this Critically Endangered bird. Research is being conducted by BirdLife South Africa's Rockjumper Fellow of White-winged Flufftail Conservation, Dr Kyle Lloyd.

We are also grateful to the generous companies and individuals who have donated field equipment to the project, including: Deynecke Engineering, Johan and Madeleen van Loggerenberg, Eurolux, Chamberlains, Jones and Wagener Engineering and Environmental Consultants, Dr Jessica Briner and Travis Duck. Your support is greatly appreciated and will go a long way to securing the survival of the White-winged Flufftail.

We also thank GroundTruth cc, Rhodes University, Verdant Environmental, the Water Research Commission, and the Organisations for Tropical Studies for awarding Dr Kyle Lloyd with scholarships to study short courses that will enable him to assess wetland health, ecosystem services, and process bioacoustic data.

The position of Rockjumper Fellow of White-winged Flufftail Conservation is made possible by Rockjumper Birding Tours through the BirdLife International Preventing Extinctions Programme.



Mabola Coalition Statement on MEC's Exclusion of Properties from the Mabola Protected Environment

Also close to home is this statement from Dr Melissa Lewis, BLSA's Policy and Advocacy Programme Manager, published on 12 February 2021:

As many of you will already be aware, BirdLife South Africa is part of a Coalition of eight NGOs who, since 2015, have been challenging the development of a new coal mine in the Mabola Protected Environment in Mpumalanga.

We are currently a party to several High Court applications, aimed at setting aside the various authorisations needed to commence mining.

The latest development in this matter is that the Mpumalanga Provincial MEC for Agriculture, Rural Development, Land and Environmental Affairs recently published his decision to revoke the protected area status for a large part of the Mabola Protected Environment in order to allow the mine to go ahead.

BirdLife South Africa and the other Coalition members are currently liaising with the Centre for Environmental Rights about how best to respond to this decision. 
LBJs ... Help!!
